#### A bit More History About Our #1205 Car Is Found by Jeff Trimble

While doing some other railroad research, I ran across some interesting notes about our #1205 National Embassy Pullman sleeping car now located where the turntable will be installed. The info was located in the book "50 Years of Railroading in Southern California 1936 – 1986", published by Pacific Railroad Society, copyright 2001.

"The year 1972...PRS took delivery of another ex-UP sleeping car, the National Embassy would be traded for Shasta daylight coach 2397 which would make railroad history in 1984 (The car made a trip from Portland to New Orleans and back behind SP 4449).



Early in the year the PR Society took delivery of the former Southern Pacific Shasta Daylight-type coach 2397 (ex-Amtrak 7512), which was obtained from a member William Gawzner who had purchased it in a recent Amtrak sale of retired cars. In exchange for this coach, the Society deeded to him our ex-Union Pacific sleeper, National Embassy, which Bill Gawzner used as a static display at his Miramar Hotel, Santa Barbara. Certain parts from the National Embassy, however, were given to us for use on our other cars as part of this transaction. (As a side note, the Daylight Coach 2397 spent a couple of years at the Fillmore & Western, and was painted in Daylight Colors. It now lives at the Orange Empire Railway Museum in Perris, California.)"

Fillmore & Western tracks at the Hwy 126 Hopper Creek crossing between Fillmore and Piru show the damage from the December/January rain storms. Here, debris from the once swollen creek covers the undermined track. Other portions of F&W trackage also required mud and debris removal plus reballasting. All scheduled F&W trains in January were canceled due to the damage. Union Pacific railroad, which connects to the F&W, had four of its five main rail lines in and out of Los Angeles (including the coast line) closed due to even more severe rain damage. The Oxnard 'local' train stayed put because it had nowhere to go! UP rails both north (at the Ventura River) and south (Somis) were washed out. # **RIC Turntable Installation Moves Closer**

The City of Fillmore signed the contract with Willdan Corporation for contract oversight and administration of the installation of our 95' railroad turntable — phase one of our Railroad Interpretive Center (RIC). Our project is one of three other local projects packaged in the Willdan arrangement. The others involve the original Fillmore Southern Pacific railroad station and a sound wall along a portion of Highway 126. Based on previously stated timeframes, construction on the turn table should begin in April. On a related item, Tony DeMaria Electric Inc. of Wilmington completed the rewind and repair of the turntable motor (including the installation of new bearings); overhauled the electric controller; and overhauled the grid bank. Tony graciously donated \$7,000 in labor and materials from the \$8,500 in total repair costs. SCRVRHS picked up the \$1,500 balance. Tony also offered his services to inspect and test the motor and related electrical parts once the turntable is installed.
