'97 SOCIETY RAILROAD FESTIVAL

FILLMORE - "110 Years of Railroad Heritage" is the theme of the second annual Fillmore Rail Festival presented by the Santa Clara River Valley Railroad Historical Society (SCRVRHS) and KVEN Radio AM 1450. Scheduled for the week-end of March 15 16, 1997, Event Chairman Pat Askren sale theme is based on the anniversary of the Southern Pacific Railroad coming to Ventura County. The annual festival is a major fund raiser for the non-profit Society and its Railroad Interpretive Center (RIC) project.

Festivities include one hour vintage steam train rides from Central Park in Fillmore west to Dudley. 'Speeder' rides, those small maintenance of way vehicles powered by gasoline engines, will travel east through the railyard. The Society's famous tri-tip barbeque will also be on hand. In addition, a railroad film festival is planned for the recently restored Fillmore Theater as well as Johnny Popper engines; scale live steamer demonstrations; an antique car show behind City Hall; and a wildlife exhibit with live animals. The Wells Fargo Stage Coach is also expected.


Funds raised at the Festival by this 501(c) (3) non-profit organization benefit the RIC. Phase one continues with plans to bring and install a 90 foot 1906 fully operational treatable to Fillmore from Kansas City.

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





CAR ATTENDANT CORNER ET BEHIND THE SCENES

he last passenger has left the late arriving Christmas Tree train but a local parade keeps the train from crossing Central Avenue and pulling into the yard. Finally a lull in the festivities sees the Car Attendants pull in the step boxes. The horn blows and the train moves. It slowly works its way through the yard gates. The Car Attendants clamor to close the car windows (tunnel the train) and empty the trash before the unnecessary passenger cars are 'cut' from the rest of the consist. No sooner does the train come to a halt and a step box put back down, than a throng of people (the night crew) pours onto the train.

Car Attendants, actors and actresses who clamored aboard have just twenty minutes to roll Santa off and convert the train into a dinner theater on rails. No sooner are access bars removed from the door of Dark Territories car, that the collected refuse comes off and boxes upon boxes of soda, liquor, glasses, cups, and ice come aboard. The bartender packs the ice and stows the drinks. The cooks fireup the dining car stove and receive their supplies through the side hatch, just like in the old days. Waitresses prepare the parlor car bar trays and set the tables in the diner.

The waitresses, cooks, bartenders,

The Car Attendants straighten up the train and check for passenger safety items. The actors and actresses commandeer the McKinneysburg sleeping car and turn it into a rolling dressing room. No sooner has the last bottle of chardonnay wine been placed on ice than Conductor Steve yells 'all aboard'!

As the train pulls slowly out of the yard, the anxious guests waiting on the platform in Central Park have no idea about the mass transformation that just took place. Nor do they have any idea of how much work was put into preparing for an evening of good food and good times.

Before we look at the year(s) ahead let us first look back to see what we've really accomplished since our founding in 1993. As Rick Swanson expressed in his Rail Festival sponsor solicitation letter, we have 1) secured a 'sweetheart' lease from the City of Fillmore on downtown railroad property; 2) obtained from the City of Fillmore an agreement for \$25,000. in matching funds for the RIC pro-ject; 3) raised over \$19,000. toward our \$25,000. goal; 4) accepted the donation of a '90 turntable from the Gateway and Western Railroad in Kansas City; and 5) received Railroad Interpretive Center turntable, roundhouse, and exhibit center architectural design services as donated by Mainstreet Architects of Ventura. We have indeed come a long way.

Last year at this time we seemed to be in the downs - the money was getting low and things weren't going too well in general. Oh what a difference there is in attitude this year! At our general membership meeting last October, Dave Wilkinson said that when the railroad became his the Society better be ready. He promised a better and cooperative relationship between the two organizations and enough railroad related work for the both of us. HOW RIGHT HE WAS! Mr. Wilkinson has more projects up his sleeve than most can imagine. And of course, we have ours. The neat thing about this is that we all work together to make it all happen.

On March 15th & 16th we will conduct our 2nd Annual KVEN Radio, Spring Rail Festival in downtown Fillmore. Event Chairman Pat Askren promises many wonderful family attractions. From steam train and speeder rides to an antique car show and of course our famous Society Tri-Tip Bar-B-Que headed by 'Chef' Johnny Gartman. There will also be arts and crafts; snack booths; an exhibit by the Wildlife Educators of America; live music; a calliope; rail exhibits; a Railroad Film Festival in the theater; and even the Wells Fargo Stage Coach is expected to appear. We need Society members to lend a hand. If you are available all or part of either day, contact Pat Askren or check in at the event command center next to the fire station in Fillmore. Car Attendant, railroad related clothing, or an official Society T-shirt is recommended.

I would like to indicate also that at the end of last year our RIC Fund grew. At this point we are only roughly \$6,000. From our match with the City of Fillmore. We would like to please the Mayor of Fillmore who said his 'wish list' is to have both a turntable in place by the end of the year along with the new doors to city hall. The doors finally came in but we need to get the turntable to town.

In all, I just want to wish all of you a very prosperous year ahead. Don't forget to come and enjoy the Rail Festival and help us out if you can. Let's make this year a real success!!

S.P. CABOOSE AID

The Southern Pacific #1119 caboose is now at it's new location north of the Fillmore & Western yard and restoration has begun.


The late 1920's caboose needs a lot of cleaning, sanding, painting, and repairs to return it to grand shape. The Society plans to use it as an office, public information center, event command post, and meeting place. Most importantly it stands as a symbol of the future Railroad Interpretive Center (RIC).

To date SCRVRHS members have rebuilt the doors, prepped the interior walls and ceilings and repaired many components. The exterior is being cleaned and prepared for painting. Soon, the Seimens Corporation will light the caboose via a solar powered lighting system. Still needed is rebuilding all window frames; replacing all the glass; undercarriage cleaning; painting; lettering; detailing and outfitting.

Plans call for the construction of a new bench seat, office work space, and storage areas. "Our first priority is to enhance the exterior of the caboose and establish the Society's presence in the community", stated Pat Askren, SCRVRHS Vice President. "This will give us a temporary home and base of operations until the RIC is complete".

We invite all Society members to help out with our first restoration project. Every Saturday morning at 9 am, the crew meets to continue the tender loving care needed to reach our goal. Come on down anytime and lend a hand. We have something to do for everybody.


